BEST PRACTICES - 1

TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: Adoption of village

- 1. GOAL:** To inculcate the importance of social values and relationship among the students.
- 2. CONTEXT:** National Social Service activities are usually institution centered. Volunteers select work around certain radius from the college during the Annual camps every year. Changing the venues every year may not be useful either to the college to record the usefulness of the work done or to the beneficiaries because of time constraints. This adoption practice definitely identifies the needs of the stakeholders and suitable planning of execution well in advance. It is obligatory on the part of the students to learn many rural centric difficulties and needs. This happens only when hands on experience is made available. Regular slum visit, survey, garbage cleaning is the common initiatives practiced elsewhere. The principle of the NSS is to be in constant touch with the communities. We have adopted a remote village by name Basavankolla, which is about 25 kilometres from the city. NSS Co-ordinator of our unit approached the head of village panchayat to convince him about adoption concept, its advantages, benefit to our students etc. After due consultations with the other stake holders, they consented for this voluntary concept.
- 3. THE PRACTICE:** Annual special camps are organized as per the calendar of events of the institution and Parent University. A detailed plan is chalked out well in advance identifying the needs and aspirations of the villagers. Members of the local governing are also invited during planning. Their suggestions are accommodated suitably. Seven to ten days activities are listed out to suit the resources available. Activities from all domains like, Awareness, cleaning, community services, popularizing government schemes etc. are accommodated. Students stay at the place of work during the camp period
- 4. EVIDENCE OF SUCCESS:** The relation between students and locale people is well established. Even villagers join our team during the work hours. Sustained development activities over a considerable period of time are visible. Villagers identify our staff and

students by name. Many public schemes are being implemented by the agencies. Health check-up camps are integral part of activities. This has helped them to a considerable extent.

5. **PROBLEMS ENCOUNTERED AND RESOURCES REQUIRED:** the village community people respond late. As social media is penetrated deep in to remote areas, they do not agree easily. Good rapport with the local body members is required to initiate the programmes. As far the students are concerned, parents of lady students hesitate to send their wards to the village camps as halt at the place is compulsory. Usually school buildings are available for the camp facilities. They lack necessary basic infrastructures like toilets, bathrooms etc. sometimes even security becomes a threat. Resource mobilization is taken care with different agencies, university authorities and off course the local body is must. The response from all is good.
6. **NOTES:** It is a best practice of the institution. To maintain the tranquility with all sections of the society is need of the hour. It is well said that “man is a social animal”.

TITLE OF THE PRACTICE: HOISTING NATIONAL FLAG DAILY

- 1. GOAL:** To instil the national values and patriotism among the students.
- 2. Higher education institutions hesitate to continue such activities as the response from the students is negative. They reject because it is not a common practice among elderly age group. Our parent organization has taken concerned agencies approval to hoist the National flag every day. This is our sheer concern to inculcate the basic values of a citizen. Nationality among the students. This is well accepted by all the strata involved. No problems were encountered.
