Feedback Obtained

The curricula of all programmes are revised once in five years to ensure relevance. Yes Details: The institution has the effective integrated mentor system providing the link between students, parents and institution. As most of the students are from rural background and it makes imperative on the part of the institution to provide mentoring i.e. guidance for allround development of the students on academic as well as cocurricular and extracurricular activities. In the beginning of the academic year, Principal, IQAC coordinator, Heads of the departments and senior faculty provide guidance on mentoring for new faculty with information about the campus, discipline and resources available to the stakeholders. Mentoring and connecting the students is done by organizing Orientation and Induction programme. Students of I Semester are briefed about mentoring system during their Orientation program conducted at the beginning of the course. The focus is to inculcate the values of equality and responsibility towards fellow citizens any creed and caste and towards society in general.

Objectives : • Aiming to develop all round personality of the student. • To enhance the student's confidence. • To establish the vibrant relationship between teacher students. • To address the issues and requirements of Women, SC/ST/OBC students. • To encourage the creative art and culture. Functioning: • The efficient mentor system is operating in our institute through which group of 25 30 students are assigned to a faculty member in the beginning of the course. • Mentors monitor and guide the students throughout three years of their graduation. • Mentors maintain the register of mentees with comprehensive information like address, cell number (Parent and student), monthly attendance and academics (in terms of internal test and Semester End Examinations), email Id, Aadhar number, and report about the progressive growth. • Mentor does SWOT analysis of the mentee and accordingly keeps track of the mentee's personal development such as curricular and cocurricular activities, discipline etc. • Mentors meet the students frequently and guide them with their studies and extracurricular activities. • They also counsel them in their personal problems and career guidance. • Mentors coordinate with parents regarding the discipline, attendance and progress of students through SMS. • The mode of communication is established through: inperson, phone, SMS, email and by establishing Whatsapp group by mentors. • Mentors act as role models and facilitate the development of leadership quality by developing the interpersonal skills and by encouraging the students to take part in various academic and extra curricular competitions. • Mentors meet parents during Parent Teacher Meet and discuss about the strength, weakness and academic progress of their ward. • The grievances of the mentees are taken up by the mentor and if necessary it is forwarded to the Principal for necessary remedial actions. • Mentoring system is monitored by the Coordinator and Principal.
